PRINCIPAL'S POST

CHAIR'S CORNER

The Local Area Committee of governors met through Microsoft Teams on 12 May. Two new governors were welcomed: Carl Summers as a new parent governor and Daniel Christopher as a new community governor. Their clear support for the academy and their background skills will make them valuable additions to the team. The focus of the meeting was around a summary of the verbal feedback given to the Principal following a Full Academy Review (FAR) of TNHA, completed on 29 April by the Trust. The feedback provided was ahead of a formal written review, details of which will be scrutinised by governors when available. What the governors found most encouraging from the verbal feedback was the strongly held view given to the Principal by the reviewers of the progress made by the academy since the last FAR regarding the behaviour and general attitude of the students towards each other, which they now found to be good in all areas of the academy. Positive behaviour from students is recognised as a precursor for high quality learning to take place and the governors praised the work being done by the senior team to support staff and students to create a platform for progress . Governors were informed of the academy plans for summer school intervention sessions. Also, Governors asked questions concerning the Year 11 assessments for GCSE grades and discussed safeguarding issues that may have arisen because of the varied pressures on families during lockdown. The discussions during the LAC meeting highlighted again just how well staff have coped with the immense pressure and extra workload placed on them as a consequence of the pandemic. Apart from their own personal pressures, they have dealt with changing processes and procedures, additional administrative paperwork, additional assessments, and the provision of online and offline teaching materials. The governors acknowledge the tremendous work being done by the staff at the academy and recognise their determination to do the very best they can for the students. *Phil Anderson*

Work has begun on their practical skills training for their forthcoming expedition and they have covered map reading skills, orienteering, along with first aid, teamwork in pitching tents, packing kit for their 2 day expedition and following the codes of the countryside. We have captured them honing their skills around the academy.





PROMOTING SPORT FOR GIRLS



We are very proud of this group of young female students taking part in a programme funded by Barclays and delivered through the FA and Youth Sports Trust.

This is aimed at encouraging more girls to take part in football.

ENQUIRING MINDS



Our Year 9 Humanities students have been constructing earthquake proof structures using actual designs from different buildings around the world out of just spaghetti, straws and marshmallows.

They then tested them by simulating a quake to see whether their construction remained unscathed.



MEANWHILE IN THE LAB



Our Year 7 scientists have been busy in the lab extracting DNA from peas.

As it rose to the top of the solution some described it as rather like clouds or a spider's web.





With Bunsen burners at the ready, and being mindful of safety protocols, students have been busy conducting flame tests in the lab. They were able to demonstrate that metal ions produce different flame colours when they are heated strongly.

Here we can see them identifying Lithium (red flame) and Barium (green flame).



Still in science, students were investigating 'flight' and were considering 4 basic rules:- flight is the process whereby an object moves through the atmosphere; for an object to be flying it must not have contact with a hard surface; the force which pulls an object to the ground is gravity; and the force which allows flight is lift.






They were in for a big surprise when suddenly they were joined by some rather cute looking ducklings and all were eager to say 'hello'.


There were certainly no complaints that their lessons were dull or boring!


SUPERSONIC MATHS
