SETTING SAIL IN SCIENCE

Inspired by HMS Queen Elizabeth embarking on her first operational deployment, Year 8 students were given the task of building 'ships' that could hold as large a mass as possible whilst still floating. The winning model held a very impressive 250g.

Photographs of the project are now on their way, via the wife of a serving member aboard, to place around the 'real ship' itself which is the joint largest & most powerful vessel ever constructed for the Royal Navy.





Students learnt that the aircraft carrier weighs 65,000 tonnes and has a top speed of 25 knots, her flight deck is 290m long and 70m wide (enough space for 3 football pitches). Certainly a great feat of engineering!

PRIDE PERSONIFIED

You may well have seen our students 'out and about' participating in the Keep Britain Tidy's Great Big School Clean (part of the campaign's million-mile mission).

Donning high-vis vests and armed with litter pickers, gloves and bags they ensured that the area outside the academy was free from any rubbish.

Eager to support Armed Forces Day staff devised a series of lessons in science with a 'military' theme including engineers who were set the difficult task of constructing a bridge that could support the weight of one military vehicle (a chocolate bar in this case).

They had to apply their previous science knowledge, thinking about which forces would be acting on the bridge and in which direction.

They then had to consider how they would construct their bridge and avoid losing supplies in the 'river' below. To make it even more challenging they were not allowed to use any glue, sticky tape or blue tac during the construction process.





Meanwhile, military cadets attended the academy in their uniform to show support for our armed forces. They looked extremely smart and suitably proud!
