CHAIR'S CORNER

The Local Area Committee met on 29 September. There is now a full complement of committed governors who have a wide range of skills and interests, and the meeting was an opportunity for many governors to meet in person for the first time after their recruitment and the relaxation of lockdown. Prior to the meeting governors had completed online Safeguarding training and all the mandatory documentation required. During the meeting the Designated Safeguarding Lead, Katie Ogden, provided governors with training to update them on changes to the Keeping Children Safe in Education document. The main purpose of the meeting was to elect the Chair (Philip Anderson) and Vice Chair (Sylvia Grice) positions and to agree an Action Plan for the coming academic year. In the lead up to the next full meeting in December it was agreed that governors would focus on the application of the academy improvement plan during planned visits to their respective links and to talk to small groups of students about their learning experiences. The mandatory key areas of scrutiny for the LAC throughout the year relate to Safeguarding, Special Educational Needs and Disabilities, Careers Education and Guidance, Disadvantaged and Specific Groups including Pupil Premium. These will be monitored across all the link areas that governors have responsibility for. In addition, planning is in place for an in depth examination during the Spring and Summer Terms (a so called 'deep dive') into 3 areas identified as key areas within the improvement plan: SEND, Reading and Literacy, Pupil Premium. *Phil Anderson*
