There is much happening in the academy to celebrate reading and lots going on behind the scenes to ensure reading is a key feature across the curriculum.

### What is happening?

- Teachers are making sure that there are more opportunities for students to read in lessons.
- The teaching of reading and vocabulary are a focus this year with displays of key words in classrooms.
- Literacy lessons for all Year 7,8 and 9 students are in place with some amazing books purchased for us to read.
- All Key Stage 3 students will complete a reading test in the first term. Students needing support with their reading will be offered an appropriate intervention.
- Plans to update and remodel the academy library with a view to opening the resource again for students at lunchtimes and at the end of the academy day.




These are some of the new books we have purchased for literacy lessons this year.
