






In the Maths department we always try to ensure that our curriculum is broad and memorable. We want students to be as passionate about the subject as we are.



CURRICULUM DAY AT TNHA

During the month of March, we undertook our third curriculum day where our students take part in a timetable of bespoke sessions as part of our broad and balanced curriculum enabling students to develop in many aspects of life and building confidence and resilience.

Year 7 students were busy in the Maths Escape Room and looked at the relevance of the subject and transferrable skills to future careers, undertook a First Aid Session with a trained practitioner delivering lifesaving skills and discussed what constitutes a healthy relationship.

The STEM team from RAF Marham delivered an interactive session to Year 8 exploring careers in the science, technology, engineering and maths industries, students also took part in a session on the importance of self-esteem and the short and long term effects of Class A drugs.

NEACO delivered a session to our Year 9 students on preparing for Key Stage 4 along with the important exam years ahead & Norfolk Police discussed how grooming can happen and how students can protect themselves or obtain help.





Our older students in Year 10 undertook sessions on the new T-levels available for them Post-16, and apprenticeships. A session on the dangers of gambling and the science behind how this becomes addictive was also well received. Students in their final year with us (Year 11) took part in a session delivered by Norfolk Police on the 'fatal 4' being the 4 driving offences most likely to result in car accidents and the ways to ensure safety. They also considered the potential dangers encountered at festivals, parties, clubbing and how to minimise these as well as considering the ways pornography can be harmful to both the viewers and those involved in the industry.





SWAFFHAM HERITAGE PROJECT

As part of the project with Breckland Council & Historic England on the future of Swaffham a group of our students, along with two visiting poets, formulated a poem a which will be developed into a commissioned piece of work using material from the workshop.

Older than the turbines and the pubs, as old as the Buttercross which happily sits as the cars crawl around it, Grandmother Swaffham watches from her window, gently holding

her jewellery from the gem shop: she remembers when Hamond's was a boy's school and the Oasis Centre was a pool hall, where Granddad used to go and play for hours.

There's always been a duck pond, she says
in a voice that sounds like a handshake
and the Rainbows and the Guides have always trotted
like ducklings with donations for the Food Bank on a Friday.
There used to be a train that ran right through McDonalds.

But she prefers the local chip shop, where she hears knapped flint echo down the decades, the smell of wheat and carrots in the fields staining her hands for a hundred forever's.

This is a historic portal: each door to Costa means pressing your shoulder against the entrance to a Grain Store and anything you need to save a life or restart a car is somewhere on a market stall.

They're building a new house on every piece of land where Grandmother Swaffham liked to lie, the grass opening in front of her, welcoming her home.

Some days, Swaffham feels like a balloon popping, a generous gesture, a clean hand and the soft touch of silk. Nothing and everything is new here: Grandmother knows every face

so is still surprised when over the horizon another Swaffham arrives, young and energetic, leaping from one fence to the next: and the young and the old Swaffham sit together

on the edge of history, holding their breath.

DESIGNING A UNIVERSITY OF THE FUTURE

On the subject of success, our Year 9 students attended a day at the UEA as part of their Subject Discovery Course. Whilst there, the students were treated to a tour of the campus. This was followed by three workshops.

The first session saw them challenged to design a new university focusing on the type of materials they would use, their sustainability, effect on the environment and cost. The second session involved the design of a lecture theatre using different types of materials which then underwent different tests to ascertain how well they had done. The final session focussed on creating logos and tag lines and creating a product brand.

They then had one hour to create their final pitch and present it to the judges to 'sell' their design. Our team of students worked diligently and with excellent examples of team work, which resulted in them being voted best design beating the other schools present.
