In Business, Year 11 students have been completing their business plans for their Enterprise Coursework. Ideas such as personalised cupcakes, football coaching, scented candles and selling art have been researched and business plans completed.

Students will now move on to the presentations, pitching their idea to a panel of judges, 'Dragon's Den style'. Who will be crowned entrepreneur of the year with the most imaginative presentation?

Meanwhile, in Health & Social Care students have been showcasing their communication skills in both one -to-one and group scenarios. It was a change for our Year 11 students from having to write long pieces of work and once the nerves were steadied, students did a wonderful job, showing they are extremely capable individuals.



The first assignment for Year 10 students has been to interview an individual of a certain age and find out how they have developed in their physical, Intellectual, Emotional and Social development, as well as how factors have impacted on this development. Students approached this task with a high level of maturity and have shown that they all want to achieve their very best.



Time to Fly

Following on from their excellent examination results at the end of Year 10, the Year 11 Travel and Tourism group have been motivated to complete their coursework for the remaining 2 units. As part of the International Travel and Tourism unit, they have to plan 2 itineraries one for a short-haul European destination and another for a long-haul Worldwide destination.

The students have interviewed several members of TNHA staff, including Mr Janes about his holiday in Italy, Ms Caro about her trip to New York and Miss Cullum about how she planned her honeymoon to South Africa. We would like to thank everyone who has supported the group with this work.

The Year 10 T&T students have learnt about the structure and importance of the industry in the UK. They are now researching and investigating destinations in the UK ranging from the 4 nation's capital cities; to historic destinations like Bath and York; to our unique coastal areas and our breath-taking countryside areas.

Down in Design Technology the Year 10 students are producing some very well-designed house signs in wrought iron, whilst the Year 11s are working on their final projects. These include projects made from recyclable materials; one student came up with a rather ingenious way in which to make a shelving unit from an old trye.

At Key stage 3 students are working on memory recall of tools , equipment and procedures and learning how to use these for cutting wood etc.

A DAY WITH A DIFFERENCE

We have recently undertaken the first our Curriculum Days this academic year which meant that our students were taken off their usual timetable and experienced a variety of sessions based around PSHE and Careers topics, appropriate to age groups. At TNHA we believe it is crucial to deliver a broad and balanced curriculum that enables our students to develop in many diverse aspects of life and to build confidence and resilience. This will in turn allow them to be prepared for their adult lives and to engage with society.

We welcomed a variety of guests into the academy to deliver topics such as finance where they considered sources of income, different financial products, protecting money and identity in the digital world, financial decisions, payslips, and savings and pensions. We also welcomed a group from RAF Marham who always deliver a particularly active and practical session on STEM careers giving the opportunity to problem solve and work as a team. Students also explored radicalisation, unhealthy relationships, understanding grooming and identifying manipulative behaviours. The local College of West Anglia, along with an independent Careers Advisor worked with students to explore different pathways after GCSE exams such as apprenticeships, subjects available for study and how to create a professional CV.









AN EXHIBITION OF EGYPTIAN ART

Our Students across KS3 and KS4 who have been exploring the theme of Egypt during extra curriculum art clubs have showcased their work at The Swaffham Rotary Club Art Exhibition.

They have explored both traditional and contemporary Egyptian art this term enjoying experimenting with painting and drawing on papyrus, experiencing how it would have been to write or draw during ancient Egyptian times. Students have also taken an individual and varied approach to the Egyptian theme, creating Pop Art inspired pyramids, Egyptian God character design and Egyptian landscapes to name just a few pieces.' SAFEGUARDING OUR STUDENTS

Online Safety - Against Extremism

A new guide for parents and carers has been launched to raise awareness of how to keep their young person safe online and prevent them being targeted by extremist material.

Topics covered include information about the different apps, games, social media platforms, message boards, fake news and clickbait, and how extremist influencers can use these to target and attract young people to their information, which often then links to extremist content.

The booklet outlines recent research, statistics and issues to look out for, along with practical tips and actions to keep children and young people safe online using the NSPCC's Team approach:

T: Talk about staying safe online; E: Explore their online world together; A: Agree rules about what is okay and what is not; M: Manage your family's settings and controls.

FREE SCHOOL MEALS

A child may be eligible for free school meals (FSM) if their parents receive any of the following benefits:

- Universal Credit with an annual earned income of no more than £7,400 after tax
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for the four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit)
- Child Tax Credit (with no Working Tax Credit) with an annual gross income of no more than £16,190
