SEND AT TNHA

What are the 4 types of SEND?

There are 4 broad areas of Special Educational Needs, these are:

- Cognition and Learning...
- Communication and Interaction...
- Social, Emotional and Mental Health...
- Sensory and/or Physical Difficulties...

Within the SEND department at TNHA we support our students in many ways from bespoke Dyslexia toolkits in lessons to 'bagel breakfasts' together with other specialised help. We support all students and not just those with a diagnosed neurodevelopment condition.

We have 2 designated rooms and an office within the department.

<u>'The Nest'</u> is space where specific students can go to have some time out with their 'take a break card', as well as an area to talk to an adult around any concerns they may have. '

<u>The Hive'</u> is used for all interventions from reading to emotional support. Both rooms are also open at social times so that students can access a 'quite area' should they need.

Our team currently consists of Ms Cooper (Acting SENDCO – Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator) and two teaching assistants Mrs Rawson and Mrs Carline (we have also been lucky enough to recruit some excellent new staff to grow our team from September).
