



LATE SUMMER NEWS

Just before our summer break students at the academy took part in a few end of term events which we are proud to share.

Sports Days at TNHA 2024

Two days of intense competition between form groups led to one of the closest finishes ever recorded in sports day history for three of the year groups. Winners from Y7's, Y9's and Y10's all finishing just two points in front of their nearest rivals. Y10's third place finishing just a further two points back from that. Meaning one or two places difference across all the events could have changed the results completely. Out of the hundreds of participants, we had 79 different winners across the two days but it was those that volunteered for events for their team just to get the points that made the real difference.

Undeterred by the changeable weather, participants raised their game to perform to their very best, resulting in six academy records being broken. Five in the field events and one on the track.

New records were set in Year 8 javelin, shot putt & high jump, Year 9 discus and relay, & Year 10 shot putt. The final results for each year are as follows:

Y7 – 3rd BFA, 2nd BJA, Champions CCO

Y8 – 3rd MLL, 2nd SBR, Champions DMS

Y9 - 3rd CWR, 2nd GRI, Champions MBO

Y10 – 3rd PSE, 2nd STH, Champions SCN

All the students involved should be really proud of what they achieved with some great entries being seen.

Harvest & Scarecrow Festival

Our Year 7 students were delighted to receive an invitation to take part in the Harvest & Scarecrow Fayre run by the Swaffham Cultural Consortium.

After learning a little about the history of the scarecrow which began after the Great Plague of 1348 when farmers were unable to find enough children to protect their crops by scaring birds by banging clappers, waving their arms or throwing stones. Farmers then begun making scarecrows by stuffing sacks with straw and carving faces into turnips or gourds. After WW11 however, many farmers decided that they could more effectively use pesticides to keep crops safe however many rural farming areas still use the age-old scarecrow.

The Duke of Edinburgh Award

The Duke of Edinburgh Award was been launched to our Year 9 students with many taking a keen interest. The award involves students completing a volunteering activity to support their local community, a physical activity for improving fitness and a skill to learn or improve upon. Activities can include: playing an instrument, afterschool PE clubs, cooking, drama and dance, art, cleaning, helping neighbours, supporting younger siblings, walking, cycling, airsoft, martial arts, horse riding, photography, looking after wildlife, supporting in the library or local charity shops, banking and money skills, litter picking plus many more. In the summer, students will also complete a walking expedition in the local countryside, carrying with them everything they need for 2 days including, tents, sleeping bag and mat, stove and food and clothes.

Outdoor Canoeing

On Tuesday 17th September our Year 10 students studying PE as an examination subject took part in a canoeing trip to Whitlingham Adventure.

This was for part of their PE Theory Unit on Outdoor Adventurous Activities, where they were assessed in the skills required for canoeing. The students learnt about the equipment required, the safety precautions needed, the different strokes used to manoeuvre the canoe and also took part in some team building games on the water. Some even learnt what to do if the canoe capsizes and how to get back into it from the water.



The Banned Book Club

The English department is pleased to announce the launch of a Banned Book Club for KS3 students. This club will provide an opportunity to read and discuss books that have been banned in various countries over the years. Titles such as *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time, Harry Potter*, and 1984 will be among the books explored, each offering unique insights into the reasons behind their censorship. The club will meet every Tuesday at lunchtime in Room 44, and students are encouraged to bring their cold lunch with them. Participating in the Banned Book Club will enhance students'



understanding of historical censorship and the reasons behind the banning of certain books.

This experience will highlight the importance of freedom of expression and the role of literature in reflecting and challenging societal norms. It is also an excellent way to develop critical thinking and analytical skills. We encourage all interested students to join this unique learning opportunity!

Student Auditions


Auditions are currently underway for parts in the Christmas Musical Evening and the Christmas Pantomime (Aladdin).

Students interested should see Miss Brown and Mr. Hatfield to take part. We are all very excited and cannot wait to find out what is in store for us during the Festive Season!




It's Competition Time!
